LETTER FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Dear Octet Community Member,

Thanks to you, Octet successfully rolled out its first year of inperson programming in 2022-23. These engagements promoted intellectual hospitality and wisdom at MIT for the blessing of all. It was a proof-of-concept year centered on promoting human flourishing and wholeness and was met with affirmation and excitement by faculty, staff, students, and alumni alike.

Wendell Berry writes, "The thing being made in a university is humanity... human beings in the fullest sense of those words—not just trained workers or knowledgeable citizens but responsible heirs and members of human culture." The Octet Collaborative is advancing this at MIT by encouraging the integration of heart, soul, mind, and strength for the glory of God and love of other (Mark 12:29-31). This integration takes the form of events, classes, and activities for faculty, staff, and students that advance intellectual hospitality and promote wisdom in areas of shared concern—civil discourse and science and tech ethics being among them.

During these times of conflict and ideological difference, the ability to build connections is vital. Octet's Diálogos events included dinner, musical performances, a speaker, and roundtable discussions that promote productive conversations on sensitive topics. Our guest speakers—academic and public thought leaders—shared their perspectives on race and identity, the overturning of Roe v. Wade, gender, sexuality, and technology, as well as mental health and faith. These events were complemented by a January-term class (IAP) called "Disagreeing Well" that equipped participants with empathic listening skills. Providentially, these offerings took place just as MIT was vetting and approving its own Freedom of Expression and Academic Freedom statement.

In the effort to promote wisdom, Octet also provided a second IAP class on science, tech, and ethics that offered ethical frameworks for issues like artificial intelligence and gene editing. This work will expand significantly in the coming years with the "A Better Future" initiative, which includes a for-credit class in the Media Lab, colloquia, Jeffersonian dinners, podcasts, and articles on the pressing science and tech ethics issues of our day.

Finally, Octet provided monthly digital newsletters and podcasts to unify the Christian faith community. Essays, interviews, updates on individual members and para-church ministry activities were also included to encourage Kingdom aspirations for all of God's people at MIT.

Thank you for being a valued partner in this work. It is with joy and excitement that we share this snapshot of the year with you.

Ol LISTENING WELL

Octet's mission is to tend to the whole person—mind, hand, heart and soul—within one's academic vocation. To advance listening well at MIT, Octet's Diálogos events promote dialogue across differences, an IAP (January term) course promotes freedom of expression and civil discourse, and the interviews with MIT community members featured in the monthly e-newsletter tends to the whole person.



02 PURSUING WISDOM IN INNOVATION AND SCIENCE

In January 2023, Octet hosted an IAP (January term) course for the MIT community titled "Science, Technology & Ethics in the Real World," featuring MIT faculty and alumni in industry to promote moral and ethical formation within one's vocation.



COMING SOON

EXPERIENCING AWE AND WONDER

Octet prepared and planned for new initiatives that will launch over the next two academic years, aimed at inviting the MIT community to experience awe and wonder through nature and the arts to encourage curiosity and unity. Programming will include an IAP class on music and the brain, guest artists and performers, ecologists and astronomers, and continuing contemplative prayer and lunch, which began in October 2023.

Diálogos: Dinner and Discussions

Historically speaking, universities have always valued pursuing truth with a spirit of discovery. Though highly aspirational, this is only possible when a community values intellectual hospitality—the sustained practice of humility, curiosity, openness, and genuine engagement. In such a community, participants are more eager to listen than to speak, to pursue understanding rather than conflict, and to embrace introspection and self-awareness in balance with self-expression. Hardly a passive posture, this kind of hospitality encourages a rigorous yet respectful engagement with ideas through critical thinking, discernment, and an enduring willingness to consider and reconsider. It is with this spirit that Octet hosted four intellectual hospitality events in the 2022-2023 fiscal year.





Disagreeing Well: IAP (Independent Activities Period) Course

In January 2023, Octet offered an IAP class that was available to MIT students, staff, and faculty to learn techniques that would encourage civil discourse. Nathan Barczi, Octet's Associate Director and Senior Theologian, received training provided by the Ideos Institute in October 2022 and taught the four-week course to roughly ten participants (attendance was variable). Participants were paired up to practice empathic listening and response.

COURSE TOPICS INCLUDED:

The Table

One of Octet's faculty advisors, Glen Comiso, is a liaison to MIT's staff. A senior director in the Office of the President, Glen and two of his colleagues founded The Table, a monthly prayer meeting for MIT's 40+ Christian staff. Octet has participated, helped to lead the group, and has spent time engaging Christian MIT staff in one-on-one meetings.





Faculty Fellowship Group

The Octet Collaborative is acquainted with 40+ Christian faculty at MIT. In addition to spending time getting to know them one-onone, Octet has consistently participated in bi-weekly faculty fellowship, alongside of other campus ministers. This group has modeled itself after the Inklings, with faculty taking turns reading their own work for critique and prayer.

Christian Meet-and-Greet

Dozens attended the meet-and-greet event cohosted by the Octet Collaborative and the United Christian Organization. Guests enjoyed dinner and heard from faculty, students, staff and campus ministers about their experience as Christians at MIT, and first-year students heard from representatives of various departments and campus groups at the start of the semester.



PURSUING WISDOM IN SCIENCE & ETHICS

Science, Technology & Ethics in the Real World: IAP (Independent Activities Period) Course

MIT is a literally world-changing institution, equipping its students, faculty, and alumni to innovate in science and technology for a better future. But what sort of future should we be building? In this mini-course, participants explored four case studies for thinking about what sorts of technologies we should be building, asking questions of meaning, purpose, and ultimate goals. In addition to learning about both religious and secular ethical frameworks, participants discussed real-world case studies of ethical dilemmas faced by the MIT community.


2023 FINANCIALS






INCOME

Income in the 2023 fiscal year increased 132% to \$217,658 from \$93,535 the previous year. Non-grant contributions accounted for the bulk of the increase from \$62,235 in 2022 to \$172,658 in 2023. Grants increased from \$31,300 in 2022 to \$45,000 in 2023. Assets at the end of the 2023 fiscal year totaled \$136,324.





EXPENSES

The 2023 fiscal year budget grew 86% from \$78,798 the previous year to \$146,990 as Octet launched its Diálogos intellectual hospitality event series. Program expenses accounted for the bulk of the increase at an 172% increase while administration expenses increased by 60% and fundraising decreased by 7%.
